Our faith-based, not-for-profit medical center is committed to providing quality patient services and addressing health needs in the communities we serve.

Baptist Health Medical Center-Little Rock is making an impact in the following ways:

- Providing blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol screenings; flu shots; diabetes risk assessments, prevention programs, education and care coordination; and A1C blood tests through community wellness centers in Little Rock
- Offering free immunizations on an annual basis to children heading back to school
- Educating elementary school children through an evidence-based program that focuses on healthy eating and physical fitness
- Promoting healthy eating and exercise to African American women through the Sister to Sister Move More, Eat More program
- Affording residents with diabetes the educational tools necessary to manage their diabetes and reduce complications, and offering prevention tips to those who have been diagnosed with pre-diabetes
- Demonstrating healthy eating habits through cooking classes, grocery store tours and a partnership with the Arkansas Hunger Relief Organization
- Partnering with local schools to assist with athletic physicals
- Supporting individuals with diabetes and Parkinson's disease as well as their family members through group support offerings
- Providing preceptorships for students going into the healthcare field
- Promoting healthy pregnancies through our community-based prenatal education program at Baptist Health Pregnancy Wellness Center-Little Rock
- Meeting the healthcare screening needs of the homeless population at two sites
